



Update from the Luptons

"It's been four years since I've spoken to another Christian and here you are!"

So much of ministry at the intersection of the nations and the next generation is finding ourselves in the right place at the right time, ready to do the right thing as God signals. So when someone told me that there was a sick U.S. Citizen in a remote area of Colombia and asked if I would go and help transport him to hospice-style care, I (Andrew) agreed.



Dan and I sat in a small, hot airport waiting to board our evacuation flight to Bogotá and eventually the States. Dan was slumped in his wheelchair as he told me about his hard life and the layers of terminal diseases that threatened his life, the most violent of which was ALS. Unable to use his arms and hands to reach his face, tears streamed down his face as Dan told me about how he had been saved by Jesus. "It's been four years since I've spoken to another Christian and here you are!"

"There it is," I thought, "the reason I'm here is to listen to Dan's profession of faith and comfort him that he'll meet Jesus face-to-face any day now. We didn't board our flight because Dan had a medical emergency in my arms attempting to do so. A chaotic ambulance ride, a confusing new dialect of Spanish in the ER, even a scary encounter with some of Colombia's famous 'bad guys' were all God's place, God's time, and God's care for Dan. In a sweltering hospital room, two men enjoyed God's promises together from God's Word as one prepared to meet Jesus face-to-face. We can minister to people like Dan at the intersection of the nations and the next generation because of your prayers and generosity. Thank you.

Will You Pray?

Speaking of hospitals, Andrew sends this from one of Bogotá's finest. We are supposed to be serving missionary families this week in Mexico at the Americas' Area Retreat. Instead, I damaged an artery in my neck during exercise and have been hospitalized for a week while the doctors thin my blood to prevent stroke or other life-threatening complications. Please pray for a full recovery over the next three to six months, that the artery would heal fully and that the migraines would subside. Evie's detailed and pictorial instructions for the nurses on how to take care of daddy are a favorite among my excellent caretakers.

THREE PRIMARY BARRIERS BETWEEN LGBT+ PEOPLE AND THE CHURCH

We feel it intrinsically: there is something different about this conversation than others. We believe that "all fall short, all are loved," but when we start talking about anything related to the LGBT+ community, we feel the room

electrify with tension. Why is that? Why can't we engage this topic like others? And what is preventing those who are affirming and LGBT+ (those who believe God allows and blesses same-sex marriages) from surrender?

1. Culture

The extremes on either side of this conversation think they have the answer for those who identify as a sexual or gender minority: Those on the extreme right (for lack of a better term) believe LGBT+ people must accept a "heterosexual/cisgender gospel." It sounds something like this: "Come to Christ, and you will be straight and identify with your given gender easily." I used to think that way. I used to think I needed to pray the gay away. Now I have learned that the Holy Spirit can empower me to surrender my broken sexuality every day—like He can empower every other person. Those on the extreme left (for lack of a better term) believe the only way to care for those who wrestle with their sexuality or gender is to say, "No more struggle! This is who you are! Love is love." They don't consider the definition of love includes "never giving up," and "rejoicing when the truth wins out" (1 Cor. 13:6,7). It is not loving to hug someone to hell. "True compassion takes into account far more than what a person feels today; it takes into account what he or she will feel on judgment day," Francis Chan wrote in his incredible new book, *Letters to the Church*, "What some do in the name of being open-minded and compassionate is actually done out of self-love and cowardice. We want to be accepted, so we listen and coddle but refuse to rebuke. If that is love, then the prophets, apostles, and Jesus were the most unloving people to ever walk the planet" (Chan, 137).

2. Shame

Conviction feels like a pinprick on our heart. It sounds like, "What you did right here isn't worth it. Confess

this specific thing." Conviction happens after we sin. Shame feels like someone shoving our heads in dirt. It

sounds like, "Who you are is worthless. Hate yourself." Shame can enter before, during, and after we sin. It makes us feel worthless for even struggling with temptation. The world says, "Rip off both feelings! Be who you are without limits!" Jesus says, *I died for you (a person made in my image) while you were a sinner (Rom. 5:8). Don't confess personhood. Confess sin.*

3. Suffering

We American Christians have a poor theology of suffering. Instead of expecting and rejoicing in it, we run from it. We may not all hold to the old health and wealth gospel, but we have a new one: Our prosperity gospel sounds like, "God doesn't want you to be sad." Pain at work? Quit. Pain in marriage?

Leave. Pain in singleness? Find your person. Pain at church? Exit. Pain from childhood? Numb out with Netflix. We are weak. *I* am weak. And because we are so weak, when we see our friends *truly* wrestling with their sexuality and gender, *truly* getting mistreated, *truly* wishing they could end their whole life because of *true*, *sincere*, *deeply rooted pain* we don't know what to do with them. We've been numbing out on our own emotional painkillers for so long we have nothing to offer them. Except we do. We must collectively learn how to return to the only One who can transform beauty from ashes

joy for mourning, hope for despair (Is. 61:3). This transformation does not happen by removing suffering and pain; it happens in the midst of it and *because* of it (1 Peter 4:12-14). This conversation is different, but it also isn't—if we are willing to look with the same gospel lens we view our own lives.

FOR PRAYER - TOP THREE

- 1. **Direction**. We sense God bringing us back to the roots of HIMH and the gospel: All fall short. All are loved. We recognize the necessity of speaking into the world's great need right now (the LGBT+ conversation), but we do not want to lose track of the greater conversation about God's good design for sexuality, gender and how it metaphors the gospel story. Pray we are wise in approaching this old/new/bigger direction.
- 2. **Spiritual attack.** I (Laurie) have been battling discouragement and fear. Some of it is inexplicable, and so I know that is the enemy trying to wipe us/me out as we grow. Will you pray?
- 3. **Books.** We have a publisher contract for my curriculum I wrote to help people wrestling with sexual brokenness walk without shame and with courage, but we haven't signed it yet. Matt and I sensed God calling us to write a bigger book on Core Needs, and so we proposed that to more publishers. Two are seriously considering this one as our first book. Please pray. If God wants it, we want it. If he doesn't, we don't either.
