

New Childcare Provider

On Sunday, August 4th, we will welcome our new Childcare Provider Mandy Mills. Mandy is currently the full-time director of Haywood Community College's Childcare Center and has held that position since 2015. Mandy has a Bachelor's degree in Child Development and Family Relations with a minor in Special Education from Western Carolina University.

Mandy is a longtime Haywood County resident and currently resides in the Bethel area with her two sons; Joseph, 23 and Sloan, 17. During her interview, Mandy remarked how very excited she was to help with some fun, hands on, toddler friendly Bible lessons and crafts. and we know her extensive childcare background and experience will be a source of inspiration and learning for all of our volunteers too.

Our Children's Ministry has been further blessed by a gift from the Church Health and Growth Committee of the Presbytery of the Southeast (POSE). The money was received as part of a grant aimed at assisting churches provide outreach and evangelism. The funding will help us as a small church to reach out to young families and provide excellent, Christ-centered childcare for even the youngest members of our congregation. As our name Providence implies, God is always providing for our needs, and the grant will enable us to cover nearly all of Mandy's salary for a year! Update from Harrison Northey

Dear Partnership Program Supporters,

Happy summer to all of you. Samantha just informed me that since it is now officially summer, each day will get shorter by 1 minute. Strange to think that tomorrow it will be closer to Christmas this year than we are to last Christmas. Most of the time I feel like time is a blur. I listened to a podcast this week where an Eastern Orthodox scholar was talking about her view of time and how it is completely informed and shaped by her faith. Among other things, she mentioned how Christians are people for whom time is significant. I can't remember a lot that she said, but she did mention that we are to be people



who view time in a forward-looking direction - towards the day when Jesus will return to the earth. And that just so happens to be what I preached on this past Sunday at Valley Hope, from 1 Thessalonians 5. Anyway, enough about time.

Thanks to all of you who have contributed to my Partnership Program, and for those who keep me and my studies in your prayers. I was on campus at Gordon-Conwell this past Saturday for my Interpreting the Old Testament class. Fun fact: did you know that when the Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered in the 1940's, they contained a scroll of Isaiah that is 1,000 years older than our earliest Isaiah manuscript we had before the Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered? See, that is a fun fact. In my class we have been reading/talking about things like ancient manuscripts, the transmission of the Hebrew Old Testament, its translation into Greek, why an understanding of these things helps us understand our Bibles today, why they give us confidence in the trustworthiness of our Bibles today, and other interesting things. We have also been learning about the task of interpreting texts and the art of translating from foreign languages, like Hebrew and Greek. I'm keeping up just a bit with my Hebrew from the last 2 semesters. My professor explained that mostly she just wants us to maintain our level of knowledge through this summer course, and then we will be adding more to it in the fall and spring Hebrew courses. Another fun fact: the very oldest bit of the Old Testament known to exist is written on a set of silver amulets dated to the 7th or 6th centuries BC. They contain a portion of the Aaronic Blessing from the book of Numbers. The coffee still flows like a robust, aromatic river in the Pilazzo di Northey, and one might occasionally hear the sounds of a banjo in the evening.

I'll leave you with that pleasant description.

From the Luptons' July Letter

"We would like to become Christians, but we want to learn more first..."

While a trade war threatens the U.S. and China, there's a spiritual war being waged over the souls of a few Chinese young people in Bogotá. Min and Kuan work for a prominent Chinese tech company. They moved to Bogotá a few months ago. Soon after they contacted our church and asked if I'd be willing to officiate their wedding ceremony. I almost always jump at the opportunity to talk about faith, life, and marriage with couples. It is consistently the most tender evangelistic opportunity I have as we engage the unconditional love of God and translate it to marriage.



But I wondered why. After all, they were already legally married in China. When asked if they were Christians, they said no. When asked what they knew about Christianity, they mentioned they had heard that God was Jesus' son. Or maybe the other way around... "So why do you want a Christian pastor to lead a Christian wedding for you?" I asked. "Because there's something more solemn to marriage than what we were offered in China." In China, they explained, their wedding day was no different than a visit to the DMV. Identification + signatures = married. They sensed instinctively that there must be more to it and to the rest of life.

I grabbed this painting off the wall of my office and laid it across the table where we sipped coffee. "You're right," I said. "God gave you those instincts. Let me explain to you why the Christian story makes sense of it all." We talked through Creation, Rebellion, Redemption, and Restoration. They were stunned that there's a narrative that connects all things and resonates with the longings of their hearts. "We would like to become Christians, but we want to learn more first..." They've only missed one service since and have already started reading (and even memorizing) parts of the Bible.

It looks like God is after my new friends Min and Kuan. Their first Sunday at worship they met Jay, who it turns out is from their same town! Jay started his exploration of Christianity about a year and half ago when he fell in love with a Colombian Christian. He was very kind, but clueless to the teachings of Christianity. Against our advice, they visited the marriage DMV while in China. Two of our new NEXT missionaries, Eric and Anna Graham, were eager to talk to Jay about Christianity. They bought him a Mandarin Bible and entertained his questions as he devoured its contents. Jay prayed a prayer of repentance and faith last month with Eric leading him to his newfound Savior. Here he is being baptized a few weeks ago by our teammate, Andrew Baxley.

In all likelihood, Jay will return to China with his family soon. Only this time, he returns as a follower of Jesus. This is life and ministry at the intersection of the nations and the next generation. We're in awe of our God who gathers and grows his church. Thank you for allowing us to be a part of this incredible ministry.

From the July McKay Update

During a walk through the city with a young Syrian couple the other day, it was noteworthy (and grievous) to me when I saw people's reactions to Sandra walking arm in arm with the wife. One could see and feel many people's displeasure and puzzlement that a Westerner would associate so freely with a hijab-wearing Arab.

We were invited to a Ramadan meal (post-sunset, of course) with some dear Afghan friends. During this time, Sam was thoroughly instructed by the oldest son in the Afghan way of eating with hands only.....there is a science to it!

After the meal, Sandra was able to slip a Persian New Testament to the oldest daughter... who said thank you but



then tried to hide it when her brother appeared. Please pray that she reads it and sees the light.

During a visit with one of our closest Syrian Arab families, the wife presented the thought that the god of the M.'s is the same as our God. It gave me (Sandra) a great opportunity to share some of the differences that center around Jesus. I was able to leave her a small Arabic booklet that explains the way of salvation, but we were interrupted when her husband came back to the house. Pray for I., that these seeds would be watered and grow.

We have a special request for all of you who are called to and love to pray. We are reforming a team of intercessors for our mission here since the Lord has been showing us our need to organize and expand the people who pray for us. About that huge tax problem...

Our German 2017 tax bill is finally taken care of. Our professional tax advisor last year sent us a payment amount that was over 4x larger than what he had previously estimated. Adger had been pressing him for the previous 10 months out of concern that this could happen... and he assured us in February, 2018 that the tax estimates were accurate. If you want to help out with this, please consider giving through Plumtree Presbyterian Church (see above information) or you can designate this through World Outreach. Unfortunately, due to our advisor's grossly low pre-payment estimates for 2018 (which we have already paid in full) we are encountering a (larger) problem this year (2019), as well. We owe approximately 1.75 times the normal German tax bill this year.
