

Unprecedented. Unheard of. We are flooded with so many words to describe this crazy season of Covid-19, in which we don't know how long social distancing, isolation, economic hardship (or collapse!) and fear of overwhelming the health care system will last.



We have become all too familiar with new vocabulary, or maybe words with vivid and visceral new significance. Take self-quarantine for example. It has an Italian root and was first used to describe the literal 40 day period in which a widow was allowed to live in her deceased husband's home free from fear of seizure of said property. Soon it came to mean the 40 day period that a ship and cargo (that was suspected of carrying disease) was isolated. Think about Lent now, we're in the middle of a 40 day period of reflection on the suffering of Christ leading up to his death and resurrection. This season seems especially appropriate considering what we are going through now as a country, a community, a church. We're not even meeting because of Covid-19. Lent: a time of reflection, of isolation, of death, and of new life. We are reminded of the words of Jesus to trust in Him. Trust is counterintuitive. We are wired to fret, to self protect, and many of our behaviors are based on looking out for number one--ourselves and our loved ones. In these quarantine days of uncertainty, let us look up and pray. Our faith is built on the foundation of the truth that God is sovereign and He directs our steps. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart", the writer of Proverbs tells us. Set your heart on the Lord; keep your eyes on Jesus. "Lean not on your own understanding" is an invitation to see the world from God's perspective and not just our own. This does not mean we park our common sense or our rational and intellectual faculties. It just means that they are not ultimate. So by all means, wash your hands often, practice social distancing, avoid crowds, and do what you can to practice proper hygiene. But ultimately know that God is in control. And yeah, it's okay to have the larder full of food, but know also that Jesus cares for you, you will not lack for any good thing, and that ultimately He provides for us—not we ourselves. I pray that this time of absence from each other will help us grow fonder of one another and we'll look upon this time as one of preparation and anticipation.

Open Door: The Open Door is not preparing meals until at least April 20th. Mountain Projects is providing 100 bagged meals each day to be handed out and Open Door is distributing food boxes as needed. We will let you know when our services for cooking and serving will be needed in the future.

Even in these challenging times, we can still find ways to extend the gospel to others, next door and even around the world. Now is a good time to call a neighbor especially those living alone. Consider, if you do absolutely have to go to the store, call a shut in and see if you can pick up essentials for them and drop them at their door. Read the mission updates from our missionaries and keep them in your prayers. Continue to financially support your local church and missions whether local or globally. Pray for all those who are still on the "front lines" serving in hospitals, nursing homes, grocery stores and other essential business. Lift up those here and around the world who are persecuted, suffering and oppressed.

REMEMBER: Deut: 31:6 Be strong and courageous. Do not fear or be in dread of them, for it is the Lord your God who goes with you. He will not leave you or forsake you.

We were so privileged to see that in an International Gathering one recent Friday night. Two Syrians and two Iranians blessed us with their presence and what a sight it was to share from His Word and listen to the ensuing ruckus of a Farsi translation and an Arabic translation going on along with the English and German discussions. Three of the four are not (yet) believers and we look forward to seeing the Lord's work in them. Pray for M., M. and M., (no really, you can't make this up!)
